### Celebrate God's New

Do not cling to events of the past or dwell on what happened long ago. Watch for the new thing I am going to do. It is happening already - you can see it now!

- Isaiah 43:18-19 (TEV)

Then the One who sits on the throne said, "And now I make all things new!" - Revelation 21:5 (TEV)

My Webster's dictionary tells me that "new" is something that never existed before. It may also be something that was only recently experienced or observed as well as something strange, foreign or unfamiliar. New can also be something that takes the place of something else. Then there is "new" as beginning again or making another start.

Think about "new." What images do you see? What feelings do you experience? New can be wonderful, marvelous, and great when we want something different from what we experience. New can also be frightening, scary, when the new is unwanted or unexpected. No matter how we perceive something new to us, it can always be an adventure to experience and grow into.

This time of year we anticipate the cycle of new. Yes, even in a year with a record warm winter, we look forward to the signs of spring and eagerly await its arrival. We eagerly await the first sightings of robins or the blossoms of the early spring bulbs. We celebrate when we see the new fawns and bird chicks. But what happens when the new demands that we make changes to how we do things, how we think or even what we believe? This "new" is not as well accepted by any of us for we are human beings after all.

Scripture tells us over and over, from the beginning to the end, that God is doing something new. That something new is always to bring God's people back into relationship with the one who gives life. From the cross, Jesus cried out: "It is finished. Father, into your hands I commend my spirit." What was finished was the "old" ways of relating to God. On the third day, the women and then the disciples would find the tomb empty. They would begin to experience God's new relationship.

As we continue to celebrate Easter let us live into the possibilities of a new relationship with God made possible by the resurrection of Jesus, the Christ. The message of the cross and empty tomb, the crucifixion and resurrection, is: No matter how far we as human beings have strayed from God and God's ways, no matter what the sin, God has prepared a way for us to have a new relationship with the one who gives life to those who believe.

For believers and unbelievers, for doubters and non-doubters alike, nothing has been the same since the Resurrection. Let us join those who first discovered the truth of the empty tomb in the Easter acclamation: "Jesus Christ is Risen! He is risen indeed!" Let us celebrate the possibilities of the NEW!

### **Hymn Sing Planned**



The inside of the church sanctuary has been cleaned in anticipation of Easter and spring. Once the weather warms up, we will also be cleaning up any winter damage to the outside.


Our meetings continue to be held on the first Wednesday of each month. Anyone is welcome to attend.
